


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

During the summer, Snapchat launched a new feature which encourages people to meet up with their friends in real life rather than just watch each other's lives on their phones. Snap map allows users to share their location, which updates each time the app is opened. There were many different reactions from the map because of privacy concerns.

"I think the snapchat map is creepy and I don't think other people should know where I am," Grace Baker (12) said.

Anyone who chooses to share their location will appear on the map as an "Actionemoji" - a cartoon avatar that changes to show what the user is doing. By tapping on an avatar, other users can see the latest additions to that user's Snapchat Story, chat with them over the app or go to meet them in person. When you


open up the SnapMap, you may also see some Snaps from people you don't know. These are Snaps that users have chosen to make public by submitting them to "Our Story", which are collections of public snaps based on common themes and locations.

When you open Snapchat, you can choose to share your location with all your friends, a select number of friends, or you can disappear entirely from the map at any time by going into Ghost Mode.

"I turn my location on when my friends want to know where I am because it's easier than texting them,"

Jazmyne Reigh (9) said. While some users benefit from finding their friends and sharing their location, others think that the map is overstepping their privacy.

"I always have my location on ghost mode because I don't want people to know where I am," Marina Cellario (11) said.



WHAT IS DACA?

The U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions announced an end to the DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) program in September. This program gave benefits to approximately 800,000 individuals, as of 2017, who entered the country illegally as minors. The policy was created by the Barack Obama administration in 2012, and was rescinded in September 2017 by the administration of President Donald Trump. WHAT TO DO

Steps to take in case you are confronted with an active shooter at school as told by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

1 React Immediately

Before being in this situation, discuss with each teacher and your peers good escape routes and places to hide. Although it's a frightening situation, don't freeze up. Act immediately, have a pre-existing plan and stick to it.

2 Forget Your Belongings

Your first instinct in this situation may be to grab all of your personal items. Your phone, wallet or purse are items that can be replaced. Leaving your belongings behind also saves time.

3 Find a Safe Place to Hide

Find a place to hide that is away from the shooter. If possible, find a room with multiple doors and windows. If you are in a room with multiple doors, close all of them and lock them. THE UGLY TRUTH ABOUT AUTOMATIC WEAPONS

Rampages editor Sarah Stephens interviews seniors Sarah Spagnoli, Alexandra Rosal and Kristina Orsi about their opinions on automatic weapons and what needs to be done to stop them.

RAMPAGES: Thank you for participating in this issue. To start, what were your reactions to Parkland?

SARAH: In my opinion, Parkland was kind of a national disaster on the school scale and within the United States. It was a wake-up call that immediately new regulations were put into effect in order to protect our nation. It seems like they were super quick to act on adults and not students. I think that's what's wrong in school, it seems like there isn't an immediate effort to protect us even though school shootings happen often. It's not safe to walk to school. Students are getting shot and trying to make a change, but since we aren't leaders, that won't be effective until the adults in power take action. I think that's what's wrong with our agents that our opinions on the subject aren't taken seriously. **SARAH:** Yeah, if you think about it, there are extra steps to make large venues as safe as possible. I think that's what's wrong with things for good reason, but then we don't have the extra protection at our schools. Something needs to happen. That's security guards or something else. **ALONSO:** Interestingly, there is a longer scale. **SARAH:** Speaking of arms, teachers, I don't think that's the answer. For example, I have a teacher that is recently a teacher on the east coast had the license to carry a gun and have it at school, but he literally locked the doors and fired multiple times. If one teacher does it, what stops other

teachers from doing the same, apart from their safety? **ALONSO:** It's really come down to student safety, not gun control. I read somewhere, when Parkland was more in the media, that our country has armed security guards in schools. I think that's what's wrong with that. It sends a message that we'll protect our money willing to protect our country at school. But also, I think that's what's wrong with that. It's a huge part, but if we think of Parkland, the shooter was mentally unstable, had a terrible temper, and was threatening to kill everyone. He put a regulation for owning and buying guns.
